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HISTORY & DEVELOPMENT

The Brothers of St. Gabriel, an international religious congregation, came to Singapore in 1936 to open a Trade School and Orphanage here. It was a humble beginning with some four brothers and a few lay people.

Unfortunately, the Japanese invaded and occupied Singapore in 1942. Brother Vincent was made a prisoner of war at Changi. There he was interned for 4 years. He met an Australian, Mr. McDermott. They were concerned for all the welfare and education of children, whose parents were killed in the war. They then decided to set up Boys' Town after the war.

After their release from prison, they embarked on the Boys' Town project in 1948. Twenty acres of church land were leased to the brothers to start a trade school and a residential home for needy boys. It started as a small orphanage and trade school.

In the Home, we have to raise funds to finance the operational cost of feeding, accommodating and educating 60 to 100 boys. There is a Corporate Communications /Fundraising Department in the Home responsible for fundraising. Boys' Town needs to raise about \$1.5 million to \$1.8 million a year for operational cost. Boys' Town is an independent, not-for-profit organisation, and is an affiliate member of the National Council of Social Service. However, it does not receive funding from the Community Chest. The provision and maintenance of the Home rely on public donations and our fundraising drives.

Boys' Town is a Catholic institution. Today, it is made up of four components – Boys' Town Home (BTH), Assumption Vocational Institute (AVI), Assumption English School (AES) & Boys' Town Alumni (BTA).

In the beginning, the staff consisted of the members of the Brothers of St. Gabriel and some lay people. Soon more lay people joined the brothers in their work to help these poor and disadvantaged boys.

Today, the Executive Director is overall in-charge of Boys' Town and directly in charge of the Home for the disadvantaged boys. She has some 30 staff to assist her in caring for these disadvantaged boys. The academic school is government aided, with a principal in charge. The same goes for the vocational institute. Together, we have about 1,600 students in Boys' Town (boys and girls).

Boys' Town offers residential care for boys within the age group of 11 to 17. We offer to provide help, guidance, shelter, academic education, vocational training and practical living skills to youth. We care for orphans, the poor, the neglected and those who find themselves in a state of crisis. There is a fixed schedule to help and guide these youths. There is a time for studies, games, music, computer lessons, tuition classes, outings and counselling.

We have three dormitories capable of housing 100 boys. Home supervisors are on 24-hour duty to provide guidance, assistance and coordinate programmes. Counselling is provided by the social workers.

THE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

2006 has been a good year for us in terms of seeing a number of programmes initiated by staff showing great results. In terms of education, due to the implementation of the 'My Achievement Program', MAP for short, we have seen 2 of our boys from the Normal Technical Stream achieving 1st and 3rd positions in their class. One has opted for greater challenges by taking up the Academic path. One of our boarders has also won a 1st place award for a National Competition on Entrepreneurship which saw him pit his thinking skills against the other students from other schools. Presently he hopes to win a scholarship for his 'O' Levels this year (2007). We have also seen our Archery Team set up in 2005 achieve some successes. This group of 7 boys has done us proud by winning 3 overall Championships in the St Andrew's Open and ACS Open and 12 Individual Medals of which some are proudly hanging in our cabinet.

Despite our continued economic success, the number of dysfunctional families in Singapore has increased and this has also increased the relevance of Boys' Town. Most of our boys come from socio-economic challenged families, hence requiring more care and love in ensuring their well being is being taken care of.

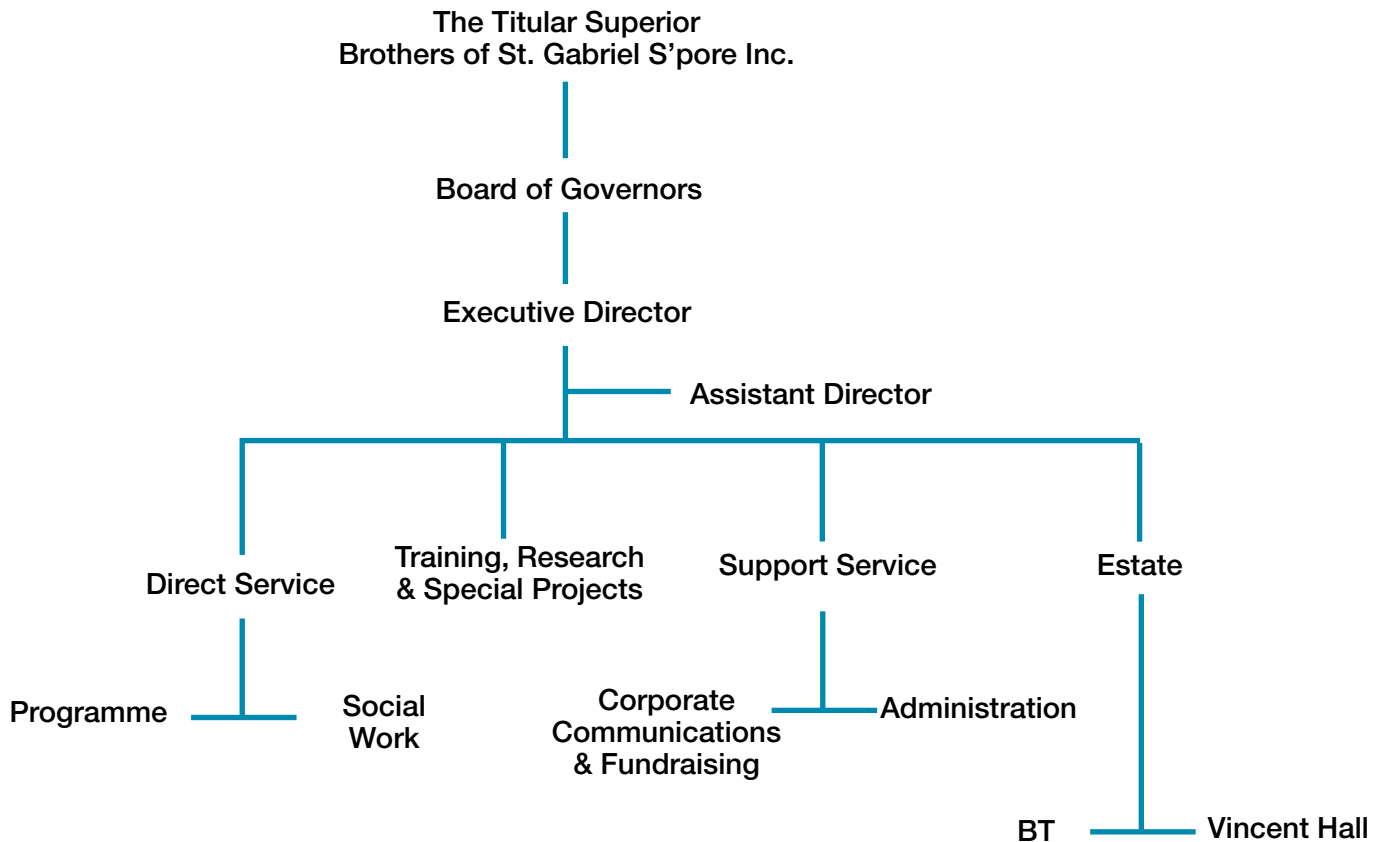

CORPORATE COMMUNICATIONS AND FUNDRAISING DEPARTMENTAL REPORT

For the year 2006, Boys' Town had 2 main fundraising activities, the " Know our Past, Value our Present" Nature Walk and Flag Day. The 2 activities are on top of our bi-annual issues of Newsletters, Christmas and Chinese New Year Appeals.

Due to the date given to us for Flag Day, we were not able to raise the desired amount. Our main fundraising event, The Nature Walk was conducted at Bukit Timah Reserve. Students from both Assumption English School and Assumption Vocational Institute were selected to help clean up a certain section of the reserve. Bookmarks with discounted coupons from participating companies were printed out and sold to the public and benefactors to raise funds.

With the challenges posed by an ever-changing society and the rising number of dysfunctional families, the relevance of Boys' Town has only increased. The funds raised is to ensure that we are still able to provide socio-economically disadvantaged boys an environment that is conducive to their education and development, so that they can be socially integrated into society.

► OBJECTIVES OF THE DEPARTMENT

Fundraising

- To raise \$1.6 million between January to December 2006
- To plan and execute new fundraising initiatives to meet the much needed target.

Corporate Communications

- To conduct talks and forums to bring about public awareness on the role of Boys' Town in today's society and to clear any misconception about Boys' Town.
- To initiate and to plan better relations with target audiences through specific communications and planned contacts.
- To involve the media in promoting Boys' Town as a Choice Home in terms of providing support for socio-economically disadvantaged youth.
- To involve the community at large in planning and getting involved in programmes and activities with the youth.
- To compliment the other departments in reinforcing organisational goals.
- To safeguard and preserve the good name of the organisation.

► FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES

Bi-Annual Newsletters

Newsletters were sent to benefactors and members of the public for information and activities within the Home and the 2 schools. Attached together with the newsletter are also appeals for donation towards the running of the Home.

Festive Season Appeals

Appeals were also sent out to our regular benefactors during the two major festive seasons, Christmas and Chinese New Year.

Flag Day

The annual Flag Day is a one-day affair for each eligible agency. These agencies are picked through a balloting process held at the National Council of Social Service. The event was held on Wednesday, 6th December 2006. The response was poor due to fewer students (as it was during the School Holidays) and the public (as it fell on a weekday). The next Flag Day will be on Saturday, 13th October 2007 and we hope to do better this time round.

“Know Our Past, Value Our Present” Nature Walk

This event was held on Saturday, 30th September 2006. The objective of this main fundraising event was to bring awareness to the students on the fragility of Mother Nature. A clean-up of part of Bukit Timah Reserve was led by Brother Dominic Kiong, Director of Boys' Town and the teachers and students from Assumption English School and Assumption Vocational Institute. As the clean-up was being conducted, the schools were simultaneously engaged in various science experiments to bring about awareness of Nature. It rounded off with a Rocket Launcher Competition. Objectives were met and it was a success.

Child Sponsorship Programme

Many of our boys come from financially and socially challenged families with some not even having a family to call their own. The Child Sponsorship Programme allows the sponsor to get closer to the child whom they are supporting. The sponsor will also receive information and a yearly progress report of the child. Upon careful screening from the Social Workers, the sponsor will also be able to take the boy out for occasional treats. Befriending a boy can take considerable time before trust can be developed. By sponsoring a child, you also fulfill the needs of such a child by providing them with lodging, meals, healthcare, education and most importantly, a chance for a future.

► CORPORATE COMMUNICATIONS

These activities would include:

- Talks to various Heads of Schools and Institutions on how they can get themselves involved in community projects with us.
- Public Tours and Forums on Boys' Town.
- Direct mailers to supporters and friends of Boys' Town.
- Liaison with NCSS, government agencies and other agencies at large.
- Administration of enquiries
- Organising community projects with corporations, clubs, schools and associations.
- Liaison with the media
- Publicity and promotions of fundraising events
- Production of publication material
- To create working opportunities between volunteers and the organisation.

SOCIAL WORK DEPARTMENTAL REPORT

► Aims & Objectives of the Department

The primary aim of the department is to enhance the social, emotional and psychological development of the boys who are admitted into the Boarding Home. It focuses on developing a systematic follow-up of the boys, creating more self-awareness as well as nurturing their personal growth. In addition it aims to educate them in the area of life skills and social skills through counselling and groupwork. The Department also looks into developing professionalism in the area of work by ensuring that each staff is equipped with skills in facilitating group work and support groups.

► Services rendered by the Department

The services rendered by the Social Work department are as follows:

1. Carrying out admission procedures which includes phone inquiries, intake interviews, making referrals and preparing assessment reports.
2. Providing individual and family counselling. At times conducting family conferences.
3. Conducting group work sessions for various categories of boys.
4. Looking into the development of social and life skills of the boarders.
5. Offering career guidance.
6. Initiating and conducting case reviews of boarders which also involves the input from the Programme department.
7. Working in collaboration with the Discipline Master and the Study Team in monitoring the progress of the boys, especially with regards to their schoolwork and general behaviour.
8. Working collaboratively with the Programme department in the following training programmes organised for the boys: Leadership training, Annual Boys' Town Camp, Orientation Camp and Leaver's Camp.
9. Liaison with different schools where the boarders are studying
10. Liaison with external agencies eg MCDS officers, Social Workers, Psychologists, Psychiatrist, Counsellors, Family Service Centres, Police etc.

► GROUPWORK

Groupwork was conducted for the following categories of boys:

(i) New Boys' Groupwork

Boys were divided into 2 groups as we had a large number of new admissions for the year 2006. The first group consisted of Pri 6 – Sec 2 boys while the second group comprised of Sec 3 and above. The department ran in total 5 sessions from January through February and the areas covered centered on counselling, bullying and touching (appropriate and inappropriate touching).

(ii) Current Boys Groupwork

This was carried out through a 2-day workshop entitled "Getting in Touch with My Feelings : Anger" from 31st March – 1st April 2006. Using the newly renovated facility of the "Movement Studio" at the Vincent Hall, the social worker in-charge facilitated the 7 participants through the process of "seeing" identifying and getting in touch with their feelings through the use of mirrors, body movements and music. Given the good facilitation skills and the fact that the trust level was high, the sessions went well in that the boys were able to share at a deeper level.

(iii) Leavers' Groupwork

The theme for the year was "Leaving a Legacy". The groupwork for this batch was completed as scheduled. In addition, all leavers went through another 6 weeks of group sessions which focussed on discovering their gifts and on self-discovery. We were blessed with an instructor and several volunteers who guided the boys in leaving a legacy in the form of a mosaic mural, which now dons our dining hall.

(iv) AVI boys

An external volunteer assisted the department in running sessions for this group of boys. There were 5 sessions in all, whereby art was used as a therapeutic tool for them to express their feelings.

► CASEWORK/CASE MANAGEMENT

• Individual Care Plan (ICP)

The overall objectives of developing and implementing a personalized ICP were to chart each client's progress and to nurture their growth. The Social Workers were able to complete it for some of the new boys during the first half of the year but could not do so after June 2006. The main difficulties the department faced was the huge amount of administrative work that was involved in completing it (the social workers had to complete 14 pages in total for each boy), the overwhelming casework and that a great deal of time was taken up in writing breach reports.

• Case Recordings

One of the department plans was to set aside at least 1 hour every morning to do case recordings. However this was not feasible due to unforeseen circumstances that surfaced as well as an overload of case management especially for CPO/BPC cases in 2006. Case recordings were thus done according to the respective social workers' pace/timings and presented at our "check-in" meetings.

• Case Consultation / Boys' Review

This was done on need-by-need basis as the flow of information amongst the direct staff was much better last year. Some of the cases were also clear-cut and did not need reviews but rather immediate action due to the severity of the offences committed by the boys.

• Resident Management Education

This was a new feature of the department for the year 2006; presentations were conducted for the direct staff in the hope that they would have a better understanding of the clients that they served as well as acquiring the necessary skills to manage them more effectively. One of the social workers did a teaching presentation on "Conduct Disorder" on 25th January 2006. The presentation involved its definition, the general characteristics, family traits and how to work with such children. On 22nd February 2006, two MCYS staff conducted a presentation for all direct staff on Child Protection cases while another external trainer presented a session on "Working with Angry Clients" on 6th September 2006.

► Other matters

• Visits

One of the highlights of the department was its outreach work that was done aggressively last year. The Social Workers played host to the following groups:

- (i) MOE school trainee counsellors – 6th Feb 2006
- (ii) School HODs / Level Heads (Primary/ Sec/JC) – 13th Feb 2006
- (iii) Students from St. Anthony's Church – 4th March 2006
- (iv) Primary School teachers (N3 cluster) – 27th April 2006

Subsequent to this publicity, there was a jump in the number of inquiries (a record high – please refer below). Unfortunately the department had to turn away many of the requests due to the inability to secure school placement.

• Integrated Case Management System (ICMS)

The department continued facing difficulties in the keying of the ICMS data. A number of cases were rejected for reasons unknown. As these data were linked to the boys' medical fee exemption cards, there was a delay in receiving them. There were also some glitches in the computer programme on the MCYS side as some old boys' data that was approved over the years were not reflected in their database although it was on ours. Nonetheless the department has been fine-tuning this.

PROGRAMME DEPARTMENTAL REPORT

It had been a most fulfilling and rewarding year yet for the Programme Department with a Head of Department leading a team of 2 Programme Co-ordinators and 3 Supervisors.

Many initiatives started by various staff had taken place this year with the ultimate beneficiaries, the boys, gaining from all of it.

The main theme for this year is 'SERVICE BEFORE SELF'.

► Objectives of the Department

For Boarders

- To introduce the importance of 'Service to Others Before Self' as a new form of leadership for the boys.
- To maximise the boys' potential in terms of studies/life skills.
- To create awareness for the boys in regard to conservation of water, electricity and the environment.
- To Eat Healthy, so as to Stay Healthy.

For Programme Department

- To create a conducive environment for work
- To upgrade the professional skills of programme staff through relevant courses.
- To improve communication amongst the staff.
- To put the interest of our clients first before ours.

► Various Programmes Conducted

Eat Healthy, Stay Healthy Boys' Town Camp (held in conjunction with students of SMU)

To coincide with one of our objectives this year on eating healthy, the Boys' Town Camp was held on 17-18 Feb 2006. The camp was jointly organised by our staff and undergraduates from the Singapore Management University. It started off with a series of educational talks, workshops and topics on 'How to Look Good' and 'New Sports' which were a hit with the boys. On the day of the Camp itself, despite being a rainy day, the boys managed to pitch up their tents together with the volunteers on the football field. Games learnt earlier during the workshops were conducted and followed by a sumptuous BBQ spread. A costume design competition was held and the boys, staff and volunteers had great fun. The next day, tele-matches which tested them on their Wits, Speed and Knowledge were conducted. It was a challenging and for some life-changing experience. The final segment was a cook-in competition where the 3 different Houses were tested on their creativity and speed in cooking. The eventual overall winner was Joseph House. The boys thoroughly enjoyed the camp and great bonding was formed between the staff, volunteers and boys.

Boys' Town Interactive Camp

The camp was held on 3-4 Mar 2006 with a separate group of SMU volunteers. Together with the boys, a Dance Studio was built at our Vincent Hall. Also during the stay-in camp, the boys were taught hip-hop dance, survival skills, cooking skills and some life skills such as 'entrepreneurship skill'. Kudos to the volunteers for carrying out such an extensive project.

Mentorship

As part of our ongoing service-learning project, we have decided to forego our leadership program in favour of 'Others before Self' concept of leadership. We have selected a group of 12 students who showed a willingness and decisiveness to embark on this concept. To develop this group of boys further, resources were utilised to engage trainers in this life transformation exercise. This year, they were involved in a service-learning project - to build toilet facilities for a village situated in rural Malaysia. To build up their endurance and leadership skills, the boys, accompanied by 2 staff took part in a 7 days gruelling expedition at Outward Bound School in Lemut, Malaysia. During the training, the boys showed great determination and teamwork throughout the duration.

Eventually from this same group of boys we will select our student mentors so that they can be examples for the other boys to emulate.

Incentive Program

The remodelling of our present incentive system has been a crucial decision this year on how to improve on our boys' conduct and contribution. In this system, points were awarded by the staff each time they feel that a particular boy has put in extra effort in wanting to improve himself in the various areas in the Home. After each particular week, the points will be tallied and used to exchange for certain goods or services. It proved to be a hit especially for boys whose lives had been full of criticism and abuse.

Catholic Retreat

Conducted by Bro. Dominic Kiong and our liturgical person in charge, it was a great 3 days camp for the Catholic boys where many Christian values were imparted.

Sports/Recreation

This year saw the inclusion of Swimming, Bodybuilding, Archery, Basketball, Soccer and Dragon Dance as part of the main core sports in Boys' Town. 14 non-swimmers joined the program in the beginning of the term and this term saw 12 graduating to the 2nd phase of intermediate swimming. Nine boys joined the Bodybuilding Club conducted by a trained instructor. Four boys will be participating in a national competition in Archery. Two boys will participate in a Basketball tournament in Kuala Lumpur. 12 boys took part in a national invitation soccer competition held in Ngee Ann Polytechnic and one managed to clinch the Most Valuable Player Award. As a follow-up to last year's participation at the National Day Parade, the Dragon Dance troupe is training very hard. As part of recreation for the boys, we have installed a TV at the Games Hall for the boys to watch during their recreation time after dinner. Also a TV room been setup as part of the Operations Room. As another new initiative, a Hobby Room has been created so that boys with varied hobbies are able to pursue them at their own leisure time. They can also utilise the Hobby Room as part of the probationers' CSO project.

40 days – Purpose Driven

A 40-days workshop where the boys leaving Boys' Town are given the opportunity to know God and themselves. It also teaches them some Christian values so that when they leave Boys' Town, they will be more purpose driven in their journey onwards.

Volunteer Appreciation Night

Held on 4 Mar 2006, staff of Boys' Town prepared a sumptuous meal to thank our volunteers for their invaluable contribution in helping Boys' Town move forward to the next phase of development. There was also the unveiling of our new Dance Studio and the boys/volunteers had a great time Karaoke session later.

Director's Night

Held on 25 May 2006 in conjunction with our mid-year leaver's night, it was a night when we celebrated leadership and boys paying homage to the present and past Directors of Boys' Town.

Education

Great emphasis had been put into the education of the boys. This year, the 'My Achievement Program' has been extended to the lower and upper Secondary students and has proven to be invaluable for those weak in their linguistic ability. Also we were able to get good, committed tutor-volunteers to help our school going students with a tutor-student ratio of 1:2. Currently we have 4 paid tutors.

From our initial batch of 3 boys for our 'My Achievement Program', two boys from the Sec 2 Normal Tech class achieved 1st and 3rd position in their standard. They were subsequently offered to be promoted to the Academic path of which one took up the offer.

Presently, we are also liaising with the National Library Board on the possibility of having a mobile library. It will help us cut cost in purchasing new books and at the same time promote the reading culture in Boys' Town.

► Volunteer-Affairs

Volunteers – An Integral Part of the Boys' Town Family.

This year has seen a huge influx of quality volunteers into Boys' Town Home. Although we hope to welcome all to be part of the Boys' Town family, we were quite selective in this area. Our aim was to maximise the mileage of the volunteers and yet be efficient in allocating them in various areas. We have seen more quality volunteer tutors this year. Also by making a prudent decision of working closely with our tertiary institution counterparts like SMU, NUS, NIE, Ngee Ann Polytechnic and a few schools, we were able to carry out much more quality activities.

Volunteer Tutors Programme

We have managed to secure the services of 9 committed volunteer tutors from various walks of life, most of them working adults committed to serving the youth for 1 year. Also we have managed to 'train' 3 tutors to conduct our M.A.P. programme with varying successes.

Singapore Management University Volunteers

Eat Healthy, Stay Healthy Boys' Town Camp – (please see previous report) consisting of 6 students from the management faculty.

Interactive Camp/Dance Studio – (please see previous report) consisting of 7 students from the business faculty.

Paint-a-Pig, Fund-a-Pig – A project where the students will teach the boys to paint little piglet figurines to raise funds for our various projects for the boys.

Other Initiatives Involving Volunteers

Cookie Factory – A group of students from the Singapore Entrepreneurship Association had embarked on a Cookie Factory project where the boys were taught some baking skills so that they can sell their products at a later date.

Music Workshop – Conducted by Music Director Alessandro, this 15-day workshop conducted every Tuesday taught our boys how technology can be used to compose and play beautiful music.

Multi-Media Interview (old folks home) – 4 boys were chosen to assist a group of students from SMU to conduct interviews in the Home for the Aged. The interview was later translated into a mini-movie. The boys were trained to conduct good interviews and writing skills.

Painting Works - On 2 - 3 Jun 2006, The American Boys' Scout Association painted the road markings and the Boys' Town Statue in front of the Director's Office. They conducted their own fundraising activities to fund this project.

Incentive Outings – An outing to the Escape Theme Park was organized by NTUC Healthcare as a form of an incentive outing for the boys. This group had been organising outings for the boys for the past 3 years and we value their support.

Basketball – A group of ex-basketball players had adopted Boys' Town to be a breeding ground for future basketball players. They had been turning up every Saturday to train the boys on basketball. 3 boys were chosen for a tournament in Kuala Lumpur in June 2006.

Entrepreneurship Camp – Held on 27-29 Nov 2006, the in-house camp aimed to teach our boys how to be innovative and how to generate their own income legally. They were tasked to make items to sell in a bazaar held at SMU on 1 Nov 2006. It was a great success as the boys were seen learning sales approaches and revenues were raised for the benefit of Boys' Town. Eventually one of our boys won the Young Entrepreneur Award in January 2007.

Save Our Earth – Held on 3rd Nov 2006, this project with NIE taught the boys to look after the environment and animals. The objective is to teach them some value on looking after Mother Nature. A service-learning project was conducted where the boys volunteered their time at the SPCA.

Jobs Placement – An initiative made together with the Social Workers to find gainful employment for boys graduating from AVI.

7-a-side Football Tournament – Organised by Ngee Ann Polytechnic and which our boys took part in. The proceeds were made towards the cause of Boys' Town.

► ACHIEVEMENTS

Archery Competition

Our boys have done us proud by garnering a total of 12 medals and winning 2 overall Championships. One of our archers has gone on to represent the Singapore Youth Olympic Team.

National Entrepreneurship Competition

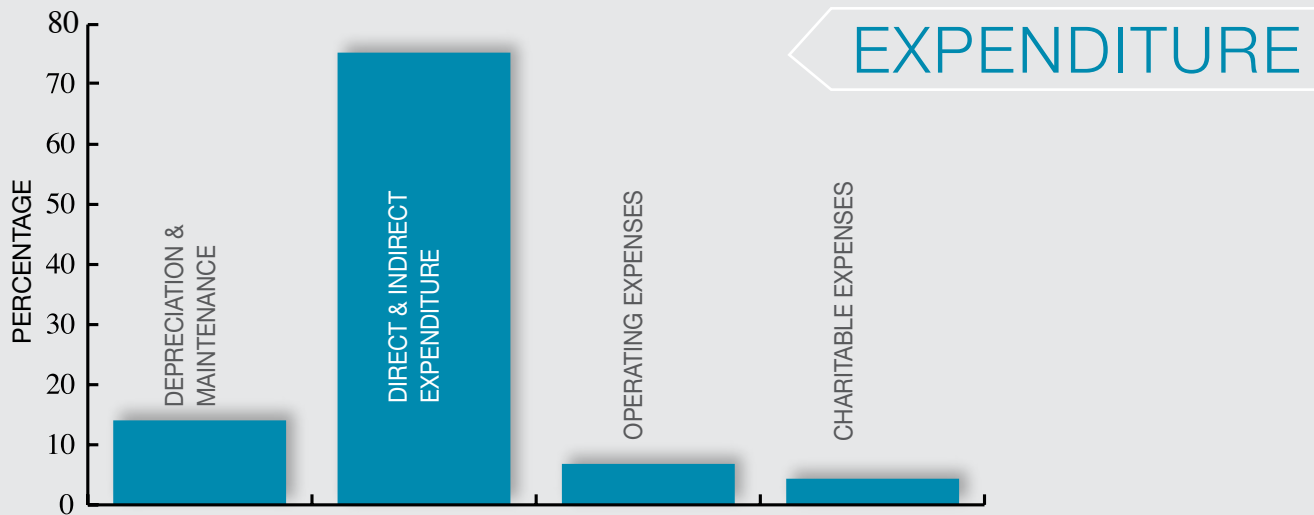

Outward Bound Training, Lemut-Malaysia

Our selected 12 boys completed the course and were awarded certificates for their participation.

'O' Levels Examinations

Djong Yi Loong, our only boy taking the 'O' Levels Examination 2006, scored a total of 15 points and made it to his choice course at the Polytechnic. This is despite facing many difficulties in his life.



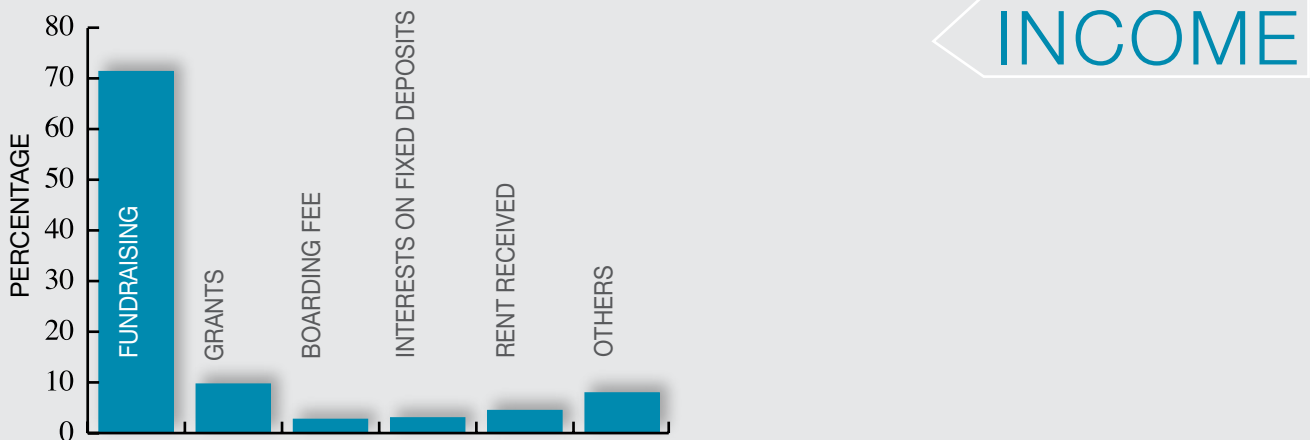
